COVID-19 Investment Scams

Salem – The Oregon Division of Financial Regulation has joined an international enforcement task force organized by the North American Securities Administrators Association (NASAA) to investigate investment fraud during the COVID-19 outbreak. “We are proud to join our colleagues in NASAA’s COVID-19 Enforcement Task Force,” said Lou Savage, Division of Financial Regulation administrator. “COVID-19 investment schemes are a significant threat and fraudsters need to know that our division is dedicated to protecting Oregonians from these scams.” The division is a member of NASAA, the membership organization of state and provincial securities regulators in the United States, Canada and Mexico. The task force consists of securities regulators and was formed to identify and stop potential threats to investors stemming from the COVID-19 outbreak. Task force members investigate websites and social media posts that may be promoting fraudulent offerings, investment fraud, and unregistered regulated activities. A critical component of fighting fraud is investor awareness. To help investors identify common telltale signs of possible investment fraud, the division recommends asking three questions before making a new investment. 1. Is the investment being offered with a guaranteed high return with little or no

Top Tips to Avoid the Scammers

Scams and frauds have existed since the early days of history, and with today's digital technology, they've become more sophisticated and difficult to detect. In 2018, the FTC recorded 5.4 million fraud reports including impostor scams, debt collection, and identity theft – 1 in 4 cases resulting in financial loss totaling \$1.48 billion. How can you protect yourself from the scammers? Here are tips to help thwart the con artists and maintain your security.

- Before It Happens - Online Sharing**
In today's world, a digital footprint can be invaluable for criminals. From social media to publicly available information, criminals are able to make scams increasingly personalized. By practicing safe online sharing practices, you can have a first-line-of-defense against scammers.
- Keep Your Information Close**
Scammers often aren't who they say they are – they can call, text or email as a friend or family member. If you're not expecting a request, don't share personal information or financial information, no matter how real it may feel.
- Don't Pay For Anything Upfront**
Whether it's a debt relief or the trip of a lifetime, scammers will explain away why you need to put a down on an initial payment. Even if it sounds amazing, do not wire, pay cash, write a check or pay via peer to peer services.
- If It Seems Too Good To Be True, It Probably Is**
When you're approached by a dream offer, make sure you do your homework and don't let your guard down. For example:
 - When was the email domain created? If it was recently – even three months ago – it's probably a scam.
 - Did you reach out to the verified company, not just the individual? To check whether a call or an email is real, contact the company the person is with – even considering reaching out to their PR firm.

risk? All investments carry risk. Anyone who says their investment offer has no risk is lying. 2. Is there a sense of urgency or limited availability surrounding the investment? If someone offers you a “can’t miss” investment opportunity and pressures you to invest right now, just walk away. 3. Is the person offering the investment, and the investment itself, properly licensed or registered? You would not seek an unlicensed doctor or dentist; you should also avoid unregistered investment salespeople and products. Watch Out for Utility Scams

Portland, Ore. — Portland General Electric and Pacific Power are working together to spread awareness and tips to help utility customers avoid becoming a victim of scams. Scammers are taking advantage of the coronavirus pandemic to target those who are most vulnerable and who may be particularly worried about potential disruption of their service. Anyone can be a target, although they often prey on senior citizens, low-income families, non-English speakers and small business owners. With the right information, customers can learn to detect fraudulent activity. “We don't want anyone to fall victim to this kind of fraud,” said John McFarland, PGE vice president for customer solutions. “If you receive one of these calls, texts or emails don't give them any information. If you're unsure, call your utility directly to check your account status and ask about payment arrangements if you need help with your bill.” Thieves impersonating

electric company employees use phone calls, texts, social media messages, emails and sometimes even knock on doors to reach potential victims. The impostors threaten to disconnect service immediately unless a payment is made within a short timeframe, usually with a prepaid credit card or even Bitcoin. These payments are not traceable and give the scammer instant access to the victim’s money. “These scammers exploit the trust of the community at a time of uncertainty,” said William Comeau, vice president of customer experience for Pacific Power. “We have been helping our customers during this difficult time by suspending disconnections, waiving late fees and providing more flexible payment arrangements.” PGE and Pacific Power encourage customers to be aware of these tips to protect themselves against scams: When in doubt, check it out! Contact the utility company to verify account information and status if someone threatens you with immediate disconnection. Use the phone number on your monthly bill or from the utility company’s website – not a number provided by the suspected scammer. During the COVID-19 crisis, PGE and Pacific Power have temporarily stopped disconnecting service for non-payment and collecting late fees and are urging customers who may be having trouble

paying their monthly bills to contact their customer service representatives directly for help. Even during normal business conditions, customers will never receive just a single notification with one hour or less to respond. A legitimate utility company employee will allow customers to call the office to ask questions and discuss arrangements. Legitimate utility companies will never ask for payment via prepaid or pre-loaded credit card. Utility companies offer a variety of ways to pay a bill, including online or by phone. Customers should never agree to purchase and pay with a prepaid card to prevent an immediate shutoff. If someone comes to the door saying they're from your utility, ask to see the employee's badge. A legitimate utility employee will have an official badge with their name, photo, company logo and contact information. If customers feel threatened or uncomfortable, they should not open the door. They should call 911 if at any point they are concerned about their safety. Scammers rely on their victim's uncertainty and panic over the prospect of having their power cut off to make them act without thinking the situation through. Stop, think and verify. Bear Attack

CRESWELL, Ore.—A male black bear injured a man after encountering him

and his dog in an incident that happened Monday, May 10 on private industrial timberland west of Creswell, Ore. The incident happened at about 12:20 p.m. about five miles west of Creswell near Camas Swale Road, which is in a semi-rural area with a mix of rural residential and private timberland properties in Lane County. The 72-year-old man was able to walk home after the incident and seek medical attention. He was treated and released from the hospital yesterday. According to an Oregon State Police interview with the victim, he and his dog had hiked from his property to the adjoining timber company property. While walking a forest road, they encountered a bear in the road only 20 feet away. The dog barked and ran at the bear. The bear knocked the dog down and was on the dog when the victim approached yelling and waving his arms in an attempt scare the bear from the dog. The bear turned from the dog and redirected to the victim. The bear charged, knocking the man to the ground. The man fought back and after a short time, the bear left. The man and dog, both injured, hiked approximately one mile back to his residence before being transported to receive medical care. The man suffered lacerations and punctures on his forearm as well as lacerations to his torso and head. He was released from the hospital yesterday after receiving treatment for his wounds. His dog was treated by a veterinarian. Both the man and his dog are expected to fully recover. The victim described the bear as mature, black

in color with a “cream” colored muzzle. He did not see any other bears at the scene of the attack. ODFW, Oregon State Police and USDA Wildlife Services responded to the incident after Lane County Sheriff notified them yesterday. Fresh bear sign was located and Wildlife Services hounds gave a short chase before treeing a large, mature male bear with a light-colored muzzle. The bear was shot and killed at approximately 5:30 p.m. Most of the private timberlands in the area are closed to public visitors and wildlife managers will monitor for other bear activity in the area. The bear is being examined and tested for a variety of diseases including rabies, which is common practice after any incident when an animal has injured a person. “This was a very serious incident and the victim took the right steps by first trying to scare the bear off and then fighting back when he was attacked,” said Brian Wolfer, ODFW South Willamette Watershed Manager. “We extend our well wishes to him and his family and hope for his speedy recovery.” “There is a very good chance that the bear that was killed is the one that injured the man, but this area is also good bear habitat and home to many bears,” continued Wolfer. “While we are not currently looking for another bear,

the area will remain closed and trail cameras will be set up to see if there are other bears matching the description in the area.” Human-bear incidents are rare in Oregon. Black bear populations number between 25,000-30,000 statewide but there have only been four previously reported incidents in the state since 1988, none of them fatal. Here are some tips for staying safe while hiking in bear country: Avoid trails with bear tracks or bear sign. Make noise when hiking so as not to surprise a bear. If you see a bear, leave the area. Stay far away from cubs—mother is nearby. Leash dogs. A loose dog may lead a bear back to you. Don't hike after dark. Consider carrying bear spray in areas known to have bears. Firearm; Unlawful Take/Possession of Buck Deer; Unlawful Take/Possession of Bull Elk; Unlawful Take/Possession of Black Bear; Unlawful Take/Possession of Cougar; Lend/Borrow or Sell Big Game Tag; Hunt Closed Season; Hunt No Big Game Tag; Fail to Properly Check in Cougar to ODFW. Fish and Wildlife Troopers located evidence of additional wildlife related crimes and three additional suspects. On April 25, 2020 Fish and Wildlife Troopers served several more search warrants relating to these wildlife crimes. These warrants involved: Nicholas Lisenby (39) from Lebanon; Amanda Hughes (37) from Alsea. Evidence was seized relating to the following wildlife crimes: Unlawful Take/Possession of Buck Deer; Unlawful Take/Possession of Bull Elk; Unlawful Take/Possession of Black Bear; Unlawful Take/Possession of Cougar; Unlawful Take/Possession of Bobcat; Lend/Borrow or Sell Big Game Tag; Hunt Closed Season; Hunt No Big Game Tag. Based on evidence seized or processed, troopers believe the three males participated in the unlawful take/

possession of 27 big game animals within the last two years, with evidence indicating many of the animals were killed during closed season or prohibited hours. Values attributed to Oregon's wildlife by Oregon Revised Statute 496.075 could total \$162,700.00 in restitution to the State of Oregon. The listed crimes occurred throughout the following counties: Benton, Lane, Linn, Lincoln, Polk and Tillamook, and charges have been forwarded for consideration of prosecution.

Paddling Fatalities Trending Up in Oregon

There have been five boating fatalities on Oregon's waterways during COVID-19 this spring, all have two things in common: not wearing life jackets, and cold water. The Oregon State Marine Board is urging boaters headed to the water during the first warm weekend of the year - especially people in canoes, kayaks, and on stand-up paddleboards, to dress for the water temperature, not the air temperature. The water is cold. "We are concerned," said Randy Henry, Boating Safety Program Manager for the

Marine Board. "People are anxious to get out and have fun, but water is serious business. If you go boating, wear your life jacket, buckle it up, and make sure it's a snug fit. Always dress appropriately, and if you're paddling, dress for the water. A dunking this time of year can be deadly." The breakdown of the five boating fatalities: four of the five were not wearing life jackets. The other is unknown. Four of the victims were male and one female. Three were recreating in paddlecraft (kayaks and a canoe) and two were in motorboats. All of the victims fell overboard unexpectedly into cold water, which is trending unlike what the Marine Board has seen in past years. This season, many people new to paddling or people who haven't paddled in a while are strongly encouraged to take a free, online Paddling Course to learn about self-rescue, how to re-board your paddlecraft, important equipment/requirements and other safety skills to develop. Start out on calm, flat water, and slowly progress to other waterbodies as skills develop. There are also paddling clubs in many communities as well as online forums with local safety infor-

mation. Additionally, the agency has received many reports of debris and obstructions this spring, so all paddlers and motorboaters should be especially cautious, keeping a sharp lookout on all waterways and starting out slow. Visit the agency's waterway obstruction page to learn where obstructions have been reported and recommendations on how to avoid them. Many obstructions cannot be immediately cleared. The open/closed status of boating access changes frequently. The agency's interactive Boat Oregon Map is a resource for finding facility contact information to help boaters with their planning and preparation. Remember to respect any closures, stay local, be self-contained, boat with members of your immediate household, and maintain physical distance for your own safety and for those around you. Written Comments Sought on Paddlers

The Oregon State Marine Board is soliciting written public comments on two citizen petitions received by the agency. The first citizen petition was received on May 4, 2020, regarding paddlecraft and personal floatation device administrative rules. The petitioner is asking the Marine Board to amend its current rules regarding personal floatation devices (PFDs) to require that all persons on paddlecraft wear PFDs during the periods before June 1 and after September 15. The second citizen petition was received on May 14, 2020, regarding administrative rules related to the Waterway Access Permit. Petitioners are requesting that the Marine Board amend its current rules so that the Waterway Access Permit expires one year from the date of purchase (as opposed to the end of the calendar year) for annual permits, and two years from the date of purchase for two-year permits. Gabbard, and provide aid if they could. Mr. Gabbard was not located. The coast guard deployed a helicopter in aid of the search and the County Search and Rescue team was activated, as well as the dive team from Bandon Fire. Sadly, Mr. Gabbard's remains were located near where he was last seen. The investigation revealed that Mr. Gabbard and some friends were improving a fishing area nearby. Mr. Gabbard had seen a log across the creek which he intended to use as an improvement to their project. Mr. Gabbard tied a rope to his belt loop and attempted to cross the river. At that time of that day, there was a strong outgoing tide. Mr. Gabbard was not able to swim against the current. When Mr. Gabbard's friends tried to pull him back in, his belt loop broke and he was caught by the current. The Coos County Sheriff's Office would like to remind the public that as the weather warms, swimming can still be hazardous. Water temperatures remain cool which may lead to hypothermia. As always personal flotation devices are encouraged or required in water activities. The Coos County Sheriff's Office was assisted by the United States Coast Guard Station North Bend, Lakeside Fire Department and Coos County Search and Rescue.

CCSO report - On May 7, 2020, at about 3:43 PM, the Coos County Sheriff's Office received a report of a possible drowning in the area behind Dunes Mobile Ranch in Lakeside. Marine deputies initiated a search by water and deputies were stationed along the bank nearby in an attempt to locate the victim, identified as 69 year old Larry Ray

Bay, was traveling southbound when it failed to negotiate a curve, left the roadway, and struck a tree. After the crash the CMV caught fire and Millington Fire Department and Green Acres Fire Department responded and extinguished the flames. Games sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased.

SAR Bandon

CCSO release - On Sunday May 17th, 2020 at approximately 2:42 a.m. the Coos County Sheriff's Office received a report of a missing person from a care facility in the area of McTimmons Rd in Bandon. The facility reported that a 77 year old male resident who suffers from dementia and normally uses a wheel chair walked away from the facility at approximately 1:30 a.m. and had not returned. Coos County Sheriff's Office Deputy Noel arrived at the facility and began assisting in the search. Deputy Noel determined that Search and Rescue resources should be called out to assist with the search. At approximately 6:08 a.m. the Coos County Sheriff's Office Search and Rescue team arrived and began their area search. Search and Rescue K9 teams consisting of the K9, their handler, and a flanker were sent out to search the area around the facility. At approximately 7:30 a.m. K9 Jaeger located Mr. Carlson on McTimmons Road after scent tracking him nearly 200 yards eastward on the roadway. Mr. Carlson was conscious, awake, and responded to K9 Jaeger's arrival. K9 Jaeger's handler, Tony Deane and his flanker Patty Sanden checked on Mr. Carlson. Mr. Carlson was helped back to the facility using a wheel chair by a staff member, where he was evaluated by responding emergency medical staff.

UEMV/Theft/Weapon

CCSO release - On May 23 at about 12:55 PM, deputies responded to the North Spit area at the end of Trans-Pacific Parkway for a reported theft from a vehicle. Deputies learned from the victim, her truck was broken into while she was horse riding. The victim was only gone for approximately 1 1/2 hours. When she returned, the front passenger window was broken out and her purse was stolen. The victim stated in her purse was all her identification, credit cards and a Ruger pistol. The victim was in the process of cancelling her

credit cards and learned there had been transactions already made. Deputies learned one of the purchases was at McKay's in Empire. Deputies responded to McKay's and were able to obtain video footage of the incident. Deputies were able to identify the suspect from the video footage and identify the suspect vehicle. Deputies attempted to locate the suspect and vehicle for several hours and were unsuccessful. On May 24, 2020, at about 1110 hours, a Timber Deputy was patrolling in the Coos County Forest off West Beaver Hill and the deputy located the suspect vehicle. The

deputy attempted to contact the suspect, who then attempted to flee the area. Since this was on a narrow logging road, the suspect was unable to drive past the deputy. The suspect fled to the end of the road and stopped at the landing. The deputy gave the suspect several verbal commands and the suspect would not comply. Having knowledge of the stolen firearm, the deputy asked the suspect if he had any weapons and the suspect held the firearm out the window of the vehicle, but did not point it at the deputy. The deputy retreated back to his vehicle and waited for additional units to arrive on scene. Once additional units arrived, deputies attempted to communicate with the suspect for approximately 30 minutes. After a brief standoff, the suspect threw the firearm out of the window of his vehicle and deputies were able to move in and take him into custody. The suspect was identified as 41 year old Jack White of Coos Bay. Deputies were able to recover all the items stolen from the victim out of White's vehicle. Deputies also located several other stolen items from several recent car thefts in the Coos Bay area. White was transported to the Coos County Jail, where he is currently being held with No Bail with the Probation Violation detainer. The Coos County Sheriff's Office was assisted by Oregon State Police and Bandon Police in the investigation. The Coos

County Sheriff's Office would like to remind the public to lock their vehicles and to not leave any valuables unattended.

ODNRA Fatal Accident

CCSO release on May 23, 2020 at approximately 6:21 PM the Coos County Sheriff's Office, Hauser Fire Department and Bay Cities Ambulance responded to a reported injury accident in the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area (ODNRA). The accident occurred at the top of a dune called V8 Hill. The operator, Ivan Noriega, age 27, of Sacramento California and the passenger, Celmi Santos Lopez, age 25, of Sacramento California, were riding in a rental Polaris XP 1000 (Class IV ATV, side-by-side). They were southbound at high speed, cresting the top of the hill, when Ivan lost control of the vehicle and flipped it several times end over end. The passenger, Celmi Santos Lopez was ejected from the vehicle because she was not wearing her seatbelt. Celmi also lost her helmet in the crash. At about 6:26 PM Coos County Sheriff's Office personnel arrived on scene. CPR was being conducted by persons on scene. Hauser Fire and Bay Cities Ambulance arrived and took over CPR. After several minutes, Celmi was pronounced dead on scene. Ivan Noriega was uninjured in the accident.

Dunes Accident Leads to Citations

On May 27 at about 8:17 PM, 911 received a call regarding an injury accident in the Oregon Dunes National Recreation Area (ODNRA). The Coos County Sheriff's Office, Hauser Fire Department and Bay Cities Ambulance responded. Two persons were transported to Bay Area Hospital and later released. The accident occurred in the ODNRA, North West of Beaver Slide Hill. The operator, 26 year old Erik Kinney, of Fairfield California suffered a severe laceration to his head and a concussion. The passenger, Alexis Mandujano, age 20, of Citrus Heights California, received a strained jaw and sprained ankle. They were riding in a class IV ATV (side-by-side) when they became airborne off of a drop off, traveled approximately 25 feet through the air and nose-dived into a hill on the opposite side. Neither person was wearing seatbelts or helmets. Eric Kinney was issued citations for DUII, Dangerous Operation of an ATV and No Operating Privilege for a Class IV Atv. When operating a vehicle on or off the dunes, please remember to exercise appropriate caution, and always use appropriate protective equipment.

Distraught Subject on Depoe Bay Bridge

On May 10th, 2020 at approximately

10:48 PM, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to the report of a possible suicidal person standing on the ledge of the Depoe Bay Bridge. Deputies Jason Spano and Garrett Brawdy arrived within minutes of the call and found a young adult male standing on the West side concrete railing of the bridge. Deputies immediately began a dialogue with the subject while Depoe Bay Fire and United States Coast Guard Station Depoe Bay were put on standby. Troopers with the Oregon State Police and responding deputies shut down traffic on highway 101 at both ends of the bridge. After approximately 11 minutes the male subject agreed to step down off the railing and continue a conversation with deputies. At approximately 11:14 PM the male agreed to be taken to the North Lincoln Hospital by Deputies Spano and Brawdy for further evaluation. The male was transported without further incident. Deputy Jason Spano has served in Law Enforcement for 21 years, he has been with LCSO for three years. Deputy Garrett Brawdy has been with LCSO for six years as a corrections deputy, he recently transferred to the patrol division. Both deputies are specifically trained as Crisis Negotiators with the Lincoln County Crisis Negotiations Team. To achieve credentials in Crisis Negotiation a deputy must attend 40 hours of specialized training in negotiations. In addition to negotiations training both deputies have had an additional 40 hours of Crisis Intervention Training (CIT). CIT is specialized training in recognizing and understanding how to deal with citizens going through a mental health crisis. In 2017 Sheriff Curtis Landers determined CIT to be so im-

portant he made it mandatory for all certified personnel with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office to attend knowing the training would benefit the citizens we serve. The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office would like the public to know the Crisis and Information Hotline can be called 24 hours a day at 1-866-266-0288 if they need help or know of someone in crisis.

Gun Shots at Old Central Coast Hospital

On Saturday, May 2, 2020 at about 12:27 PM, Lincoln City Dispatch received a call that there was an active shooter on the property of Samaritan North Lincoln Hospital. Additional information indicated the shooter was now in a black car and had been shooting a handgun in the parking lot area. Lincoln City Police quickly responded to the call and located the involved vehicle and subject in the NW parking lot of the old medical clinic buildings located in the 2900 block of W Devils Lake Road. The first officer on scene made contact with the involved subject, who was later identified as 21-year-old Oscar Gonzalez Moreno of Lincoln City. The subject exited his car with the handgun and held it to his head. The officer began talking to Gonzalez Moreno and after a short time was able to get him to drop the gun. Gonzalez Moreno was taken into custody without further incident on a mental health hold and transported to the hospital emergency room for medical and mental health evaluation. During the investigation it was found that Gonzalez Moreno was despondent over some personal life issues and had been armed with a 9mm Smith and Wesson hand-

gun. He had fired a number of rounds into the air and had about half a magazine of ammunition left in the gun. Area buildings were checked for damage from bullets, but no damage was found. After the initial evaluation at North Lincoln Hospital was completed, Moreno was transported to Corvallis Hospital for further mental health treatment. The case investigation will be forwarded to the Lincoln County District Attorney's Office for review and determination of criminal charges. Thankfully no one was injured during this event.

Hwy. 34 Fatal

On Monday, April 27, 2020, at approximately 1:35 PM, Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to the report of a single-vehicle crash on Hwy 34 near milepost 11. Preliminary investigation revealed that a silver Honda Accord, operated by Kyle Herbison (26) of Tidewater, was traveling westbound when it crossed the eastbound lanes, left the roadway, and rolled onto its side. Herbison sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. Hwy 34 was closed to one lane for approximately 5 hours.

Increasing Police Patrols Central Coast

With Lincoln County's recent application approval for the COVID19 Phase One reopening process, the Sheriff's Office will be increasing proactive education and enforcement efforts relating to traffic safety. Also a phased approach, these efforts are designed to increase safety for our citizens as travel increases in our county. Deputies will be primarily focusing on dangerous driving and what is known as "The Fatal Five" traffic vio-

lations- impaired drivers, speed, safety restraints, following too closely and improper lane changes. Deputies will be employing safety measures during their contacts to create social distancing when possible and continue the use of PPE when appropriate. It is anticipated with restrictions easing, businesses reopening and nicer weather ahead, we will see a substantial increase in motorists on our roadways. The Sheriff's Office is reminding all our citizens and those passing through to please respect social distancing guidelines, obey traffic laws and travel safely so we can all stay healthy and enjoy the summer ahead.

Death in Custody Suit Settled

On October 25, 2018 at about 10:27 pm, during a routine adult in custody welfare check in the E-pod housing unit of the Lincoln County Jail, Corrections Deputies discovered Joshua Parker Gilileo, Depoe Bay, OR. unconscious and hanging from a bedsheet that he attached to a light fixture in his single occupant cell. Corrections Deputies immediately began Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR), administered an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) and called medics, but were unable to revive him. Mr. Gilileo was pronounced deceased by arriving paramedics at 10:54. The Newport Police Department along with the District Attorney's Office completed a death investigation and determined that Mr. Gilileo committed suicide. An internal After Action Review was completed and determined that deputies responded within policy, procedures, and best practices. Mr. Gilileo's estate filed a tort claim against the County as a result of the suicide death while he was in the County's custody. Lincoln County's insurance carrier (City County Insurance Services-CIS) has agreed to pay \$850,000 (pending court approval for settlement) to the family of Mr. Gilileo and their attorney, related to the October 2018 suicide death of Mr. Gilileo. Mr. Gilileo was lodged at the jail on criminal charges. Mr. Gilileo was arrested on October 22, 2018 for Violation of Restraining Order (3 counts), Unlawful Use of Weapon, endangering a Person Protected by a Family Prevention Act, Car-

ry Concealed Firearm, Domestic Menacing, and his previous release agreement was revoked. Between October 16, 2018 and Mr. Gilileo's arrest on October 22, 2018, he was arrested 4 times on related domestic violence charges. He was released on Security Release (bail) for the two previous arrests a short time after he was taken into custody, but bail was not posted for him as a result of the October 22, 2018 arrest and he remained in custody. As part of the intake process for all individuals booked into the Lincoln County Jail, a series of demographic, medical and mental health/wellness questions are asked. The information is forwarded to the Jail's Mental Health Counselors who review and follow-up with the individual as needed. This was a very tragic and unfortunate event for the family as well as the Corrections Deputies and Corrections Medical Staff involved and will have a lasting impact on everyone. Even when policies and procedures are followed, knowing that someone made the personal decision to end their life can be mentally and physically challenging to those tasked with ensuring the safety and security of our facility and adults in custody. Our sincere condolences go out to the family and friends of Mr. Gilileo. Although the Sheriff's office maintains the staff's actions involving Mr. Gilileo while he was at the jail were appropriate and met the applicable standards of care, because of the costs and uncertainty of litigation, and on the advice of the County's insurance carrier, the decision was made to resolve the matter if it could be done for an agreeable amount of money.

This settlement allows the family and Sheriff's office personnel to avoid the emotional and time-consuming process of litigation. In settling the case the County admits no wrongdoing.

Hwy. 20 Fatal

On Wednesday, May 13, 2020 at approximately 3:12 P.M., Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency person-

nel responded to the report of a single vehicle crash on Hwy 20 at Elk City Road. Preliminary investigation revealed that a Freightliner Utility truck, operated by Patrick Goddard (23) of Eugene, was traveling eastbound on Hwy 20 when it left the roadway, went through a guardrail, and landed up-side-down in a nearby waterway. Goddard sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. The passenger, Jason Landry (42) of Eugene, was transported to Good Samaritan Hospital in Corvallis.

Hwy. 101 Fatal North Coast

On Sunday, May 17, 2020 at approximately 2:09 P.M., Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to a two-vehicle crash on Hwy 101 milepost 63, just north of the Tillamook Cheese Factory. Preliminary investigation revealed that a BMW Z3, operated by Samuel Hacker (36) of Scappoose, was traveling northbound when for unknown reasons veered into the southbound lane where it struck a Ford Explorer, operated by Julie Leonnig (43) of Tillamook. Hacker sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. A passenger in the BMW, Shayna Tacadena (32) of Gresham, was transported by ground ambulance to Adventist Health Tillamook Hospital with serious injuries. Leonnig received minor injuries. Hwy 101 was closed for approximately 3.5 hours following the crash.

Hwy. 20 Fatal

On Monday, May 18, 2020 at approximately 10:49 A.M., Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to the report of a two-vehicle crash on Hwy 20 near milepost 11. Preliminary investigation revealed that a Honda Accord, operated by Max Metcalf (86) of Waldport, was traveling eastbound when it lost control and slid into the westbound lane. The Accord was struck by a westbound Peterbilt log truck, operated by Rodney Smith (67) of Philomath. Metcalf sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. Smith was not injured. Hwy 20 was closed intermittently for five hours following the crash.

Stolen Property, Drugs, Central Coast

On May 20th, 2020, at approximately 7:00 PM, Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office Tactical Response Team conducted a search warrant on a residence in the North Deerland Drive area of Otis. The

search revealed stolen property, including firearms, that had been taken during burglaries in the north Lincoln County area over the past several months. Controlled substances, drug paraphernalia, packaging materials, and a large amount of US currency were found at the residence in addition to the stolen property. The suspect, 75-year-old James D. Golden of Otis, was not present at the residence during the initial execution of the warrant. Golden was spotted by deputies driving past the residence a short time later. Deputies conducted a high-risk traffic stop on Golden's vehicle and took him into custody without incident. A search of Golden's person and vehicle yielded an additional large sum of US currency, approximately 20 grams of methamphetamine, approximately 10 grams of heroin, and packaging materials. Golden was transported to the Lincoln County Jail where he was lodged on charges of Possession, Manufacture, and Delivery of Heroin; Possession, Manufacture, and Delivery of Methamphetamine; Felon in Possession of a Firearm; and Theft in the First Degree (by Receiving). His bail was set at \$1,100,000. A second subject, 51-year-old Richard A. Kraus of Otis, was contacted at the residence. Kraus was issued citations in lieu of custody on two outstanding misdemeanor arrest warrants from Clackamas County. A third subject was detained and later released without charges.

Nashville Rd. Fatal

On Thursday May 21, 2020, at approximately 8:07 A.M., Oregon State Police Troopers and emergency personnel responded to the report of a single vehicle crash on Hwy 180 (Nashville Rd.) at milepost 1. Preliminary investigation revealed a Ford F350, operated by William Coolbaugh (63) of Eddyville, was traveling eastbound on Hwy 180 (Nashville Rd.) when for unknown reasons the F350 drove over the embankment on the south side of the roadway and crashed upside down in the Yaquina River. Coolbaugh sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. An 11 year old male passenger also sustained fatal injuries and was pronounced deceased. Other passengers Jacob Roberts (37) of Eddyville and a 15 year old male were transported for injuries. Hwy 180 (Nashville Rd.) was closed for approximately 6 hours following the crash.

Phoned 911 Over 20 Times

On May 20, 2020, at approximately 11:00 pm, Deputy Jack Dunteman with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to a disturbance occurring at a residence on SW Southmayd Lane in Waldport. The caller reported a male, later identified as 39-year-old Timothy Richard Swander of Waldport, was in-

side her residence and refusing to leave. Dispatch advised the caller had barricaded herself in her bedroom after hearing Swander yelling and banging items around in another part of the house. Deputy Dunteman arrived at the residence and witnessed Swander ripping fan blades off the ceiling fan inside the residence. Deputy Dunteman detained Swander who appeared highly intoxicated. Per the caller's request, Swander was trespassed from the location and provided a ride back to his residence where he was cited and released for Criminal Mischief III and Criminal Mischief II. Shortly after being released, Swander called 911 demanding Deputy Dunteman return and provide him a ride to the original caller's address to get his cigarettes. Deputy Dunteman returned Swander's call which went to voicemail. Deputy Dunteman left Swander a voicemail advising him that he would not be responding to such requests and preemptively warned him for Improper Use of Emergency Notification System. Swander called 911 a total of 24 times over the next two hours. None of the calls were for actual emergencies. Throughout this time frame, Swander made false reports in an attempt to receive law enforcement response. Swander also requested medics, which he declined once they arrived at his residence. Swander was warned several times by the dispatch center for Improper Use of Emergency Notification System. Additional deputies with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office responded to Swander's residence and he was taken into custody. Swander was transported to Lincoln County Jail where he was lodged on the charges of Criminal Mischief II, Criminal Mischief III, 3 counts of Initiating A False Report, Interfering with a Peace Officer and 24 counts of Improper Use of Emergency Notification System. His bail was set at \$442,500.

Attempted Murder Charge Central Coast

On May 19th, 2020 at about 10:00 PM, three Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies and a Lincoln City Police Officer were in the Otis area investigating a disturbance call. While at the scene, deputies

and officer heard what sounded like gunshots coming from the area of North Fawn Drive. Two units left the disturbance call and began investigating the shots they had just heard. Three minutes later, WVCC Dispatch received a 911 call from a resident near the shooting location. The 911 caller reported a subject came to his door saying he had been shot. Deputies went to the location where the shots were reported and began investigating the incident; however, they could not immediately locate the victim. A Sheriff's Office K9 team was called to the scene to assist in finding the still-unknown victim. Deputy Smith and K9 Nix located the victim in the yard of a nearby property. The victim had not sustained life-threatening injuries. The Lincoln County Major Crime Team was activated to continue the investigation. The Major Crime Team consists of members from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office, Lincoln City Police Department, Newport Police Department, Toledo Police Department, Oregon State Police, Lincoln County District Attorney's Office, and Federal Bureau of Investigation. Investigators determined the incident had been a failed robbery attempt that escalated to the point of gunshots being fired at the victim. A search warrant was executed at a residence on North Fawn Drive, which yielded a firearm and other evidence of the firearm having been discharged during the robbery attempt. Three suspects were taken into custody in connection with the incident. On May 28th, 2020, a Lincoln County Grand Jury indicted the following people: 35-year-old Otis resident Nelson Leonard Jackson- Attempted Murder in the Second Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the First Degree with a Firearm (x3), Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the First Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the Second Degree with a Firearm, Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the Second Degree, Robbery in the Third Degree, Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the Third Degree, Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Unlawful Use of a Weapon with a Firearm, Attempted Assault in the First Degree with a Firearm, Attempted Assault in the Second Degree with a Firearm (x3), and Menacing. 31-year-old Otis resident Glenn Lavaughn Thompson- Attempted Murder in the Second Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the First Degree with a Firearm (x3), Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the First Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the Second Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the Second Degree, Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the Second Degree, Robbery in the Third Degree, Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the Third Degree, Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Unlawful Use of a Weapon with a Firearm, Attempted Assault in the First Degree with a Firearm, Attempted Assault in the Second Degree with a Firearm (x3), Attempted Assault in the Third Degree (x4), and Menacing. 49-year-old Otis resident Bobby Jo Monk- Robbery in the First Degree with a Firearm (x3), Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the First Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the Second Degree with a Firearm, Robbery in the Second Degree, Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the Second Degree, Robbery in the Third Degree, Criminal Conspiracy to Commit Robbery in the Third Degree, Felon in Possession of a Firearm, Unlawful Use of a Weapon with a Firearm, and Menacing.

owner at his residence, however he fled from the location just prior to deputies arriving. The other person involved in the disturbance emerged from the residence and began describing what took place. An investigation revealed 48-year-old Waldport resident Richard D. Leach had forced an unwilling victim into a vehicle at gunpoint. Leach then drove the victim to several places around the Waldport area before stopping at a location where the victim was able to escape. Leach physically assaulted the victim multiple times during the encounter. A firearm was recovered during the investigation. Deputies searched for Leach extensively over the next several days. The vehicle Leach used in the incident was found burned on a remote forest road during the search, but Leach could not be located. On May 28th at about 4:45 PM, Leach was seen in a Toyota Corolla near milepost 3 on Highway 34 outside of Waldport. Deputies attempted to initiate a traffic stop on Leach, but he failed to yield, and a pursuit ensued. As the pursuit was initiated, the Corolla was reported stolen from a residence on Highway 34. The pursuit lasted approximately 45 minutes over forest roads between East Canal Creek Road and East Eckman Creek Road. During that time, Leach struck a vehicle passing by and attempted to hit the involved patrol vehicles. Despite both rear tires failing, Leach continued to attempt to elude deputies. To prevent the pursuit from going back into Waldport and heavier traffic, the vehicle's front tires were deflated with spike strips near the intersection of E. Eckman Creek Rd and E. Lakeside Dr. The vehicle mechanically failed in the 500 block of E. Eckman Creek Rd and rolled to a stop. Leach refused to comply with repeated verbal commands to surren-

Waldport Kidnapping/ Elude

On May 16th, 2020, Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputies were dispatched to a disturbance outside a business in the 300 block of Hemlock Street in Waldport. der. Sheriff's Office Patrol K9s Bonni and Nix were deployed. K9 Nix entered the vehicle and successfully apprehended Leach. Medics were summoned to the scene for injuries Leach sustained during the K9 apprehension. While being treated at the scene, Leach spit blood on emergency medical personnel. Leach was taken into custody and transported to Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital. Leach was charged with Kidnapping in the First Degree, Unlawful Use of a Weapon, Criminal Mischief in the First Degree, Unauthorized Use of a Vehicle, Attempting to Elude Police, Aggravated Harassment, Coercion, Pointing a Firearm at Another, Reckless Driving (x2), Menacing, Assault in the Fourth Degree, Failure to Perform the Duties of a Driver (Misdemeanor), Recklessly Endangering Another Person, Disorderly Conduct in the Second Degree, Offensive Littering (x3), and Criminal Trespass in the Second Degree. His bail was set at \$730,000.

Florence Stabbing Suspect Arrested

Gregory Cross, a suspect in the fatal stabbing outside of Florence, was just located by an Oregon State Police Trooper. We appreciate everyone keeping their eyes out for him! This case is still being actively investigated. More information will be released as it becomes available. Original News Release sent 5/29/2020 at 10:30 a.m. The Lane County Sheriff's Office is seeking the public's assistance locating the suspect in a stabbing south of Florence that was reported on 5/29/2020 shortly before 1:00 a.m. The victim was transported to the hospital but did not survive the incident. Deputies are working to identify next of kin before publicly identifying the victim. The suspect, identified as 32 year old Gregory Domonic Cross of Florence, fled the area. Deputies searched for Cross for multiple hours with the assistance of the Florence Police Department, the Oregon State Po-

lice, the Eugene Police Department, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, and the Reedsport Police Department but have been unable to locate him. Cross is described as a white male standing 6'0" tall and weighing approximately 190 pounds with short blond hair and brown eyes. Community members are urged to contact the Lane County Sheriff's Office if they have seen Cross or know his whereabouts. Illegal Guiding Tillamook Co.

An Oregon fishing guide had an envelope of cash and clients ready to fish when he was cited for illegal fishing activities on May 19 in Tillamook County. The citation concludes an ongoing investigation into his activities by Oregon State Police. Kyle Buschelman, 41, of Eugene, was on the Nestucca River

boat ramp with clients ready to launch when Oregon State Police Fish and Wildlife Senior Trooper Ryan Kehr approached him at about 7:40 a.m. Buschelman initially stated he was fishing with friends. However, after interviewing passengers in the boat, it became clear to Trooper Kehr that the trip was conducted as a matter of business. In addition, Buschelman had an envelope of cash comparable to standard guide fees for that number of passengers. Buschelman eventually admitted to booking guided fishing trips online through his website, promoting himself as a licensed and registered guide. Trips were generally for the Willamette and McKenzie rivers, and recently in Tillamook County waterways as well. He said he had not gotten around to completing the licensing renewal process. He and his passengers did have valid fishing licenses and tags. The Oregon State Marine Board registers outfitters and guides annually to certify that they carry the minimum liability insurance required

by law, they have current First Aid and CPR training and if required, have a US Coast Guard (USCG) Operator License and/or Surety Bond. Under Oregon Statute, Failure to register as a Guide/Outfitter is a Class A Misdemeanor. Buschelman was subsequently cited and released into the Tillamook County Circuit Court for Unlawful Compensation for Non-Licensed Guide/Outfitter. Guides who skirt regulations create unfair advantages for themselves. "This maintains an even and fair playing field," Trooper Kehr said, "This makes it fair for everyone else who is taking the time and paying the fees and following the rules."

"With boaters and paddlers looking to get back on the water and escape cabin fever, take time to ensure you are prepared," said Dan Shipman, recreational boating safety specialist, 13th Coast Guard District. "Remember, always maintain a safe speed for the prevailing conditions, keep an eye on others, and keep a safe distance to avoid risk of collision. Always be prepared for an emergency, but have the skills to prevent an accident before it happens." Consider these safety tips before heading out on the water: Wear a life jacket: Life jackets save lives. More than two-thirds of all boating fatalities are drowning incidents and over 80 percent of drowning victims were not wearing a life jacket. Accidents can leave a strong swimmer injured, unconscious, or exhausted in the water. Never boat under the influence: It is illegal to operate a boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs. There are stringent penalties for violating BUI/BWI laws, which can

include large fines, suspension or revocation of boat operator privileges, and jail time. Alcohol use is the leading known contributing factor in fatal boating accidents. File a float plan: Leave a detailed float plan with a friend or family member who is staying back. The sooner a party can be reported overdue, the more likely a positive outcome will result. Your float plan should include information that rescue personnel need in order to find you. For examples of a float plan, visit: www.floatplancentral.org Monitor weather broadcasts: Unpredictable weather and strong winds can develop quickly across the Pacific Northwest. Be sure to check marine forecasts prior to getting underway. Don't get into conditions that exceeds your vessels capabilities or your own. Forecasts can be heard by tuning to Channels 1 to 5 on a marine radio or by checking the NWS website: www.weather.gov Take a VHF-FM marine-band radio: Cell phones may lose signal offshore or run out of battery power. They are helpful but are not reliable for emergencies that occur on water. Channel 16 is the marine emergency channel. It should only be used for emergencies. Bring a Signaling De-

vice: Have a portable device to communicate an emergency on the water. Mariners should have signal flares, a whistle, an emergency position-indicating radio beacon (EPIRB), or a personal locator beacon (PLB) to alert first responders. Know your vessel: Make sure your vessel is in good mechanical condition and all safety equipment is on board. Operator inattention, improper lookout, operator inexperience, machinery failure, and excessive speed rank as the top five primary contributing factors in accidents. Dress for the water temperature: Water robs body heat 25 times faster than air, so getting wet only increases the risk of exposure. If the water is below 60 degrees Fahrenheit, you might have 10 minutes of ability before you start to lose dexterity. USCG Swimmer Honored

NORTH BEND, Ore. — A Coast Guard rescue swimmer received the Meritorious Service Medal Thursday, April 30, during a ceremony at Coast Guard Sector North Bend's base. Petty Officer 2nd Class Chad Morris was recognized for his lifesaving actions on the morning of Oct. 22, 2019, at approximately 9:30 a.m. Morris responded to a fellow aircrew member who was suffering acute ventricular fibrillation leading to cardiac arrest while standing duty at Coast Guard Air Facility Newport. The Meritorious Service Medal is a military award presented to members of the U.S. Armed Forces who distinguished themselves by outstanding achievement during peacetime. The duty aircraft commander called on Morris, the duty rescue swimmer, and emergency medical technician, after finding the duty flight mechanic slumped over a computer terminal not breathing and lacking a pulse. After directing a call to 911 and requesting an ambulance, Morris ordered the on-duty copilot to begin chest compressions. Meanwhile, he ran to the helicopter to grab the automated external defibrillator and attached it to the unresponsive flight mechanic. While awaiting the AED scan Morris started mouth-to-mouth in coordination with the chest compressions. The initial scan from the AED reported "shock advised" and Morris quickly initiated the shock. During CPR procedures, Morris continued monitoring the AED scans. Four full AED scans were completed before first responders were able to arrive. Morris also directed a call for assistance from the on-duty crew from the local Life-Flight station, and when the life flight duty crew arrived they administered medications and performed advanced airway procedures. The ill Coast Guard

flight mechanic was quickly transported to Samaritan Pacific Communities Hospital in Newport and then transferred to Oregon Health and Sciences University Hospital in Portland for further care. "Coast Guard rescue swimmers have a daily impact on the lives of the American public, but rarely do we get a chance to save one of our own," said Chief Petty Officer Roderick Ansley, chief of the Sector North Bend aviation survival technician shop. "Possibly rarer is a first tour rescue swimmer receiving the Meritorious Service Medal." Five separate agencies, Coast Guard, Seal Rock Fire Department, Newport Fire Department, Pacific West Ambulance, and LifeFlight, all responded and worked cohesively to aid and save the ill Coast Guardsman. "Without a doubt, AST2 Morris' actions were instrumental to saving the life of the Coast Guard flight mechanic," said Capt. Kevin Nolan, Sector North Bend's flight surgeon. "He recognized the medical emergency and took decisive action. His quick decision to use the AED is what brought the flight mechanic back to life." The Meritorious Service Medal is a 1 1/2-inch-diameter bronze medal made up of six rays expanding out from the top three points of what would be a five-pointed star. Two smaller stars outlined with carved edges are within the star. Standing upon two branches of upward-curving laurel, in front of the bottom of the star, is an eagle with its wings up-raised. A ribbon joins the laurel between the feet of the eagle. Encircled on the reverse side is the inscription "United States of America" and "Meritorious Service." Cmdr. Michael Baird, aircraft commander, MH-65 Dolphin helicopter, and Lt. Cmdr. Joshua Smith, co-pilot, MH-65 Dolphin helicopter, were both awarded the Coast Guard Achievement Medal for their life-saving efforts.

Vessel Taking on Water

PORTLAND, Ore. — The Coast Guard and Portland Fire and Rescue rescued six adults and one child Saturday afternoon, May 9, from a 40-foot boat taking on water in the vicinity of Kelley Point in Portland. A Coast Guard Station Portland 29-foot Response Boat-Small II crew and Fire Boat 17 removed the sev-

en people from the vessel. No injuries were reported, and five of the boaters were taken to shore. The master of the boat and another person are assisting Tow Boat US in salvage efforts. Watchstanders at Coast Guard Sector Columbia River received a mayday call over VHF-FM channel 16 at 1:05 p.m. The Station Portland crew diverted from assisting a vessel that ran aground near the I-205 Bridge and arrived on scene at 1:18 p.m. After assessing the incident, the Coast Guard crew removed five of the boaters off the Lawilila, a 40-foot trophy boat. Fire Boat 17 arrived on scene at 1:25 p.m. and removed the two other boaters. The Lawilila reportedly hit and got stuck on a submerged piling. Initially, on-scene crews attempted to remove the boat off the piling but were unable to do so. No pollution has been reported. Salvage efforts are continuing at this time.

USCG Kayaker Rescue

WARRENTON, Ore. — A Coast Guard aircrew rescued a kayaker who had capsized near the Grays Harbor entrance Sunday afternoon, May 10 near Ocean Shores, Washington. An MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter crew from Coast Guard Sector Columbia River hoisted the kayaker and transported him to the helicopter pad at Coast Guard Station Grays Harbor, where he was checked out by emergency medical services. He was treated for symptoms related to hypothermia and released. Watchstanders at Sector Columbia River received a call from Pacific County Dispatch at 2:10 p.m., requesting assistance in rescuing a reported capsized kayaker near the entrance to Grays Harbor. The Jayhawk helicopter crew was diverted from training, and 47-foot Motor Life Boat crew from Station Grays Harbor was launched. Due to foggy conditions the visibility was only 200 yards offshore. The kayaker was spotted by searchers at 2:45 p.m., and a rescue swimmer was lowered down to pull the man from the water at 2:53 p.m. The tide was on the flood cycle, and the man was floating in about 15-feet of water at the time of the rescue while in the vicinity between Damon Point and Ocean Shores. The man was dropped off to EMS at 3:10 p.m.

The 47-foot MLB crew recovered the kayak. Conditions on the bar were 2 to 4-foot swells and water temperature was 56 degrees Fahrenheit.

Upgraded Emergency Radio System for Mariners

SEATTLE - The 13th Coast Guard District has implemented a groundbreaking technology to assist mariners in distress on the waters of the Pacific Northwest. Across Washington and Oregon, mariners can provide vital location information to Coast Guard rescue crews from their smartphones without having to download an application. In addition to common life-saving devices known to mariners, such as Electronic Position Indicating Radio Beacons (EPIRB's) and VHF radios, the Coast Guard now has the i911 application as an additional tool to provide lifesaving information from a mariner's cell phone. The i911 system is a free service developed by Callyo Incorporated. It provides fast and accurate location data to the Coast Guard in a simple web-based interface. If a mariner has recently or is actively connected to a cell-tower, the user's smartphone could provide Global Positioning System information, potentially up to 20-nautical miles offshore. The Coast Guard has the ability to send a text message to the mariner's cell phone requesting permission to access the GPS location information; all the mariner needs to do is enable location information in their smartphone settings and click the link provided in the text message. The Coast Guard can then utilize the provided positions to direct search assets to the mariner's location. The 13th District continues to adapt with modern times to assist mariners in distress. In an age where smartphones are an essential part of everyday life, the i911 system is another tool that can be used by Coast Guard search and rescue teams to provide rapid assistance in the maritime domain. While this new technology is highly effective, mariners are advised that i911 should not replace standard VHF radios. VHF channel-16 remains the most reliable means of communication for mariners in distress. "While VHF radio remains the most reliable form of distress communication,

this tool gives the Coast Guard another avenue to rapidly locate mariners in distress utilizing smart phone technology," said Lt. Cmdr. Colin Boyle, the 13th District's command center chief. "In addition, the location sharing feature is only utilized during an active search and rescue case and can be turned off by the mariner at any time." This tool is readily available to first responder agencies across the country, including the Coast Guard. The Coast Guard ran a pilot program from May - November 2019, in which the new application was instrumental to resolving several search and rescue cases in the New England region. USCG Rescue at Haystack Rock

WARRENTON, Ore. — A Coast Guard aircrew rescued two kayakers in distress in the vicinity of Haystack Rock Saturday afternoon, May 15 near Pacific City. An MH-60 Jayhawk helicopter crew from Coast Guard Sector Columbia River hoisted the kayakers and transported them to the helicopter pad at Pacific City Airport, where they were met by awaiting emergency medical services. Their medical condition is unknown at this time. Watchstanders at Sector Columbia River received a call from Tillamook County Dispatch at 1:47 p.m., requesting assistance in rescuing two kayakers in distress. One of the kayakers had fallen into the water near Haystack Rock. The Jayhawk helicopter crew was diverted from training, and a Coast Guard Station Tillamook Bay 47-foot Motor Lifeboat crew launched. The Pacific City Fire Chief arrived on scene at 1:53 p.m. and reported spotting the kayakers approximately 50-60 yards offshore. The helicopter crew arrived on scene at 2:15 p.m. and located the two men. Within 15 minutes, the rescue swimmer had recovered both men. "It was good that they were wearing life jackets," said Petty Officer 2nd Class Billy Sizemore, the flight mechanic on the Jayhawk crew. "But, they were also wearing waist-high rubber waders, which filled with water

and counteracted the buoyancy of the life jackets. Between the cold water and the heavy waders, the man simply couldn't pull himself back into his kayak before succumbing to exhaustion and the preliminary stages of hypothermia." The men were dropped off to EMS at 2:35 p.m. Sea's were at 2-feet and the water temperature was 56-degrees Fahrenheit. The Coast Guard reminds boaters that with a changing season comes warmer weather; however, the waters of the Pacific Northwest are still dangerously cold. It's best to wear wet suits or dry suits along with a Coast Guard-approved life jacket whenever venturing out onto the ocean or waterways.

Drug Bust off Oregon Coast leads to Prison

PORTLAND, Ore. – The suspect apprehended in a historic Coast Guard drug seizure off the Oregon coast in 2019 was sentenced to prison Thursday, May 21. John Philip Stirling, 66, a Canadian citizen, was sentenced to 40 months in fed-

eral prison and five years' supervised release for possession with intent to distribute methamphetamine under the Maritime Drug Law Enforcement Act (MDLEA). On April 9, 2019, while on a routine patrol, the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Alert detected a sailing vessel traveling north, 225 nautical miles of Newport, Oregon, in international waters. The vessel, named Mandalay, had a home port of Seattle, Washington. When Coast Guard personnel attempted to communicate with Stirling, he would only respond via VHF radio. Once Coast Guard members determined the Mandalay was a vessel within the jurisdiction of the U.S., they boarded and found Stirling to be the vessel's sole occupant. Stirling stated he did not have vessel documentation and refused to produce identification. Upon further questioning, Stirling's speech began to deteriorate and he displayed signs of a possible drug overdose. Shortly before Coast Guard personnel boarded the vessel, Stirling consumed a large amount of what he believed to be pure fentanyl, but was

later determined to be pentobarbital. Coast Guard personnel administered medical aid to Stirling and evacuated him by helicopter to Astoria, Oregon. He was later transported by ambulance to Adventist Health Portland for additional treatment. The Mandalay was towed to port and later searched pursuant to a federal warrant. Investigators searched the vessel and discovered 28 jugs containing more than seven gallons of liquid methamphetamine each and a duffel bag containing several plastic-wrapped bricks of pentobarbital. Investigators later learned the drugs had been loaded onto the Mandalay from another vessel in the Sea of Cortez for delivery to Canada. "The volume and value makes this the largest known maritime seizure by the Coast Guard off the Oregon coast, and we applaud the men and women of the Coast Guard Cutter Alert for their diligence in making the apprehension," said Lt. Cmdr. Scott McGrew, of the Coast Guard 13th District in Seattle. The cutter's Health Services Technician, Petty Officer Scott Engler, received the Coast Guard Commendation Medal for his valiant efforts in helping keep Stirling alive for a total of six hours until a Coast Guard Air Station Astoria helicopter arrived on scene and medically evacuate Stirling to a hospital. On Jan. 13, 2020, Stirling pleaded guilty to one count of possession with intent to distribute methamphetamine under the MDLEA. This case was investigated by the U.S. Coast Guard Investigative Service (CGIS) and Homeland Security Investigations (HSI), with support from U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP).
