COVID-19 Fraud Schemes

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General (HHS-OIG), and Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) are warning the public about several emerging fraud schemes related to COVID-19 vaccines. The FBI, HHS-OIG, and CMS have received complaints of scammers using the public's interest in COVID-19 vaccines to obtain personally identifiable information (PII) and money through various schemes. We continue to work diligently with law enforcement partners and the private sector to identify cyber threats and fraud in all forms. The public should be aware of the following potential indicators of fraudulent activity: Advertisements or offers for early access to a vaccine upon payment of a deposit or fee. Requests asking you to pay out of pocket to obtain the vaccine or to put your name on a COVID-19 vaccine waiting list. Offers to undergo additional medical testing or procedures when obtaining a vaccine; Marketers offering to sell and/or ship doses of a vaccine, domestically or internationally, in exchange for payment of a deposit or fee. Unsolicited emails, telephone calls, or personal contact from someone claiming to be from a medical office, insurance company, or COVID-19 vaccine center requesting personal and/or medi-

cal information to determine recipients' eligibility to participate in clinical vaccine trials or obtain the vaccine. Claims of FDA approval for a vaccine that cannot be verified. Advertisements for vaccines through social media platforms, email, telephone calls, online, or from unsolicited/unknown sources. Individuals contacting you in person, by phone, or by email to tell you the government or government officials require you to receive a COVID-19 vaccine. **Tips to avoid COVID-19 vaccine-related fraud:** Consult your state's health department website for up-to-date information about authorized vaccine distribution channels and only obtaining a vaccine through such channels. Check the FDA's website (fda.gov) for current information about vaccine emergency use authorizations. Consult your primary care physician before undergoing any vaccination. Don't share your personal or health information with anyone other than known and trusted medical professionals. Check your medical bills and insurance explanation of benefits (EOBs) for any suspicious claims and promptly reporting any errors to your health insurance provider. Follow guidance and recommendations from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and other trusted medical professionals. **General online/cyber fraud prevention techniques:** Verify the spelling of web addresses, websites, and email addresses that look trustworthy but may be imitations of

legitimate websites. Ensure operating systems and applications are updated to the most current versions. Update anti-malware and anti-virus software and conduct regular network scans. Do not enable macros on documents downloaded from an email unless necessary and after ensuring the file is not malicious. Do not communicate with or open emails, attachments, or links from unknown individuals. Never provide personal information of any sort via email; be aware that many emails requesting your personal information may appear to be legitimate. Use strong two-factor authentication if possible, using biometrics, hardware tokens, or authentication apps. Disable or remove unneeded software applications. If you believe you have been the victim of a COVID-19 fraud, immediately report it to the FBI (ic3.gov, tips.fbi.gov, or 1-800-CALL-FBI) or HHS OIG (tips.hhs.gov or 1-800-HHS-TIPS).

Winter Traveling in Oregon

Winter weather is here, and Oregon Office of Emergency Management State Search Rescue Coordinator Scott Lucas says Oregon is seeing uptick in lost or stranded travelers on foot and in vehicles. He is reminding Oregonians and visitors of ways to stay safe. Lucas says the search and rescue community in Oregon stands ready to respond when needed, but that being safe and prepared should always be the priority. That means being having food, water, maps and other items needed for comfort and safety in the event you get lost or stranded. Also, knowing your route and weather conditions before you go is important, said Lucas. "Technology should not replace sound planning when using GPS in your car, or for an adventure on foot like going out into the woods with your family this holiday season to look for a tree. Careless planning can result in discomfort, injury – or worse yet – loss of life," Lucas reminds us. "It is a good idea to have an emergency kit in your car, and extra supplies when you travel on foot." Lucas recommends not relying on GPS alone and using resources for Oregon travel like tripcheck.com or calling 511 for road conditions. The Oregon Office of Emergency Management Search and Rescue program supports a broad spectrum of search and rescue operations in Oregon. That mission includes coordinating activities of state and federal agencies involved in search and rescue, liaising with the Oregon State Sheriffs' Association and other organizations, and providing on-scene search and rescue coordination when requested.

Now is the Time to Prepare for Flooding

With a wet, cold winter expected and

burn scars prevalent from the 2020 wildfires in Oregon, it is important to be ready for flooding and landslides. Heavy rain can trigger mudslides and debris flows in steep terrain, and the risk is higher in wildfire burn areas. Debris flows are rapidly moving, extremely destructive landslides. They can carry boulders and logs in a fast-moving soil and water down steep hillsides and through narrow canyons. To find the latest information on weather watches, warnings or advisories in Oregon you can visit the National Weather Service. If your home, work or driving route is in a watch area, here are some helpful pointers: Stay alert and track the flood watch by radio, TV, weather radio or online. If told to evacuate, do so immediately. Listen to unusual sounds that might indicate moving debris, such as trees cracking or boulders knocking together. A trickle of falling mud or debris may precede larger landslides. If you think there is danger of a landslide, leave immediately. Watch the water. If water in a stream or creek suddenly turns muddy, or if the amount of water flowing suddenly decreases or increases, this is a warning that the flow has been affected upstream. You should immediately leave the area because a debris flow may soon be coming downstream. Travel with extreme caution. Assume roads are not safe. Be alert when driving, especially at night. Embankments along roadsides may fail, sending rock and debris onto the road. To prepare for a floods, landslides, or any emergency it is important

to have an emergency kit with necessary supplies. The Oregon Office of Emergency Management recommends being 2 Weeks Ready with enough supplies to last at least two-weeks. Be ready and stay safe. For more information about what to do before, during and after a flood visit the OEM website.

ONG Deployment Returns to Oregon

SALEM, Ore. - More than 200 Oregon Army National Guard Citizen-Soldiers assigned to 2nd Battalion, 162nd Infantry Regiment, headquartered out of Springfield and Gresham, and part of Task Force Kosovo, returned home following their ten-month deployment to Kosovo, Dec. 8, 2020. The Oregon Citizen-Soldiers arrived at the Portland International Airport, Oregon and were greeted by senior leaders before later boarding buses to connect with family and friends at Camp Withycombe in Clackamas and Lane Community College in Eugene. The Citizen-Soldiers spent two weeks at Ft. Bliss, Texas for mandatory COVID-19 quarantine protocol prior to arriving in Portland. Since earlier this summer, Oregon Army National Guardsmen have been returning home from the second-largest mobilization since WWII. The final group of Soldiers who were deployed in Kosovo is scheduled to return home in the next few weeks before Christmas Eve. The last mobilization of Oregonians this size was in 2009 through 2010. "2020 dynamic year, both home and abroad for the Oregon National Guard. We are happy to welcome home our team members just in time for the holidays," said Ste-

phen Bomar, Director of Public Affairs, Oregon Military Department.

2019 ODFW Prosecutor of the Year Awards

On December 4, 2020, Jackson County Assistant District Attorney Melissa Leritz was presented the 2019 Oregon State Police Fish and Wildlife Division Wildlife Prosecutor of the Year Award. Assistant DA Leritz is described as not only caring about her job, but also caring about the resource. She has shown dedication and passion toward the prosecution of those committing fish and wildlife crimes, and despite her increased work load at the District Attorney's Office, she continues to request to be lead on fish and wildlife crimes. Assistant DA Leritz also works actively with the Rogue Valley Team by putting on educational training to keep them current with case law. OSP & DNA

Oregon State Police has partnered with the University of North Texas Center for Human Identification for over 10 years to process and upload missing person and unidentified person DNA profiles into the COmbined DNA Index System (CODIS). UNT-CHI has also provided invaluable service to all 36 Oregon counties by sponsoring and managing the National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs). Unfortunately, due to a loss of federal funds, the UNT-CHI can no longer process ANY missing person or unidentified remains samples outside the state of Texas. UNT-CHI will also be limited in their management of the NamUs website as of **January 1, 2021. DNA Analysis:** The OSP Forensic Science and Pathology Bureau will now be sought out by Oregon law enforcement agencies to provide the services that UNT cannot. In the coming days, we will communicate our analytical capabilities and limitations regarding the submission and processing of biological samples in missing person cases and unidentified remains cases. OSP cannot provide the suite of DNA examinations and services that UNT has provided in the past; however, we are committed to assisting Oregonians and Oregon law enforcement and

will strive to provide DNA analyses to the best of our abilities. If you have missing person/family reference standards to submit for DNA analysis, please retain them securely until further notice. Additional information regarding future DNA services is forthcoming. **National Missing and Unidentified Persons System (NamUs):** Death investigators and law enforcement agencies routinely begin with the NamUs website to determine if DNA, dental records, and fingerprints from both missing persons and unidentified remains are available for searching and comparison purposes. In addition, families of missing persons access NamUs to provide and search for important information about their loved ones for "matching" or associating cases. Negotiations appear to be ongoing regarding the maintenance and management of the NamUs website; the National Institute of Justice is acknowledging the burden that suspending this national information repository would bring. NamUs is a crucial tool to the forensic science, pathology, anthropology, missing persons, and law enforcement communities. Our hope is that it remains a state-wide and nation-wide resource and service may continue uninterrupted. Again, additional information regarding the maintenance and manage-

Former Police Detective Arrested

On November 27, 2020, at approximately 3:58 P.M., Oregon State Police Troopers were dispatched to a multiple vehicle crash at the intersection of South 6th Street and Crater Lake Parkway. The driver that caused the crash, later identified as, Thomas Dwayne Reif (27) was driving a silver 2013 Dodge Avenger. Reif was a detective with the Klamath Falls Police Department, was on duty at the time of the crash, and was driving his assigned Detective vehicle. Just prior to the crash, Klamath County 911 received a call describing Reif as

driving recklessly down South 6th Street. Reif was evaluated at the scene by Klamath County Fire District 1 personnel and found to be unresponsive and not breathing. He was transported to Sky Lake Medical Center where emergency department personnel were able to quickly stabilize him. The Klamath Falls Police Department immediately requested the Oregon State Police take lead on the investigation. Troopers began a DUII investigation and collected evidence the night of the crash. Evidence was sent to the Oregon State Police Crime Lab as part of the investigation. Members of the Oregon State Police Criminal Investigation Division were brought in to work with the Patrol Division on the investigation. While evaluating the evidence seized in the investigation, Troopers developed probable cause that Reif had unlawfully obtained and used drug evidence from an unrelated case in the course of his duties. Once lab results were obtained on the evidence, Troopers sought to arrest Reif for DUII, Reckless Driving, Recklessly Endangering Another Person, Official Misconduct 1st degree, Tampering with

Evidence, and Unlawful Possession of a Controlled Substance (Schedule II controlled substance – fentanyl); Thomas Dwayne Reif was booked into the Klamath County Jail on December 15, 2020.

Driver Licenses for All law takes effect January 2021

DMV release - Starting in **January 2021**, the new "Driver License for All" law takes effect, and you will no longer need to provide proof of legal presence to get a standard Oregon driver license or ID card. The law was passed by the 2019 Legislature as House Bill 2015. The standard driver license and ID card will remain as acceptable proof of driving privileges and as an identification document. The standard license or ID card, however, is not Real ID compliant, so you will not be able to use it to get on a plane beginning **Oct. 1, 2021**. Appointment required: To apply for any type of Oregon driving privileges or ID card, you must make an appointment at DMV2U.Oregon.gov. DMV adds appointment slots regularly to the online scheduling tool, with 15,000 being add-

ed today for **March 2021**. So, check regularly until you find a time and DMV location that work for you. When you go to DMV for your appointment, wear your face mask and follow all other safe-distance practices during your visit. What you need to qualify: At your DMV appointment: Provide proof of identity, current legal name and date of birth, such as your passport (current, or expired less than five years) or consular card; Provide proof of Oregon address; Provide your full 9-digit Social Security number (or certify you have not been issued an SSN); Pay fees; Pass all required tests; Have your picture taken/ The card design and fees will be the same as they are today. Also the same as today: If you do not provide proof that you are a U.S. citizen, you will not be automatically registered to vote under the Oregon Motor Voter Law. Online services: Many other common DMV services are available online or by mail, such as replacing a lost or damaged driver license or ID card. Find out what's available now at OregonDMV.com or DMV2U.Oregon.gov. More information: Find out more about what docu-

COVID-19 Vaccine for Dept. of Corrections

The first Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) employees received the Moderna Therapeutics COVID-19 vaccine Monday, Dec. 28. DOC has received enough doses to treat 400 people and anticipates regular access to, and distribution of, additional vaccines in the future. In the coming months, this protection will be offered and strongly encouraged to all DOC staff, contractors, Oregon Corrections Enterprises employees, and adults in custody (AICs). Prioritization of vaccines will be determined by guidance from the Oregon Health Authority (OHA), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP), and the Governor's Office. Dr. Warren Roberts, DOC's Chief Medical Director, was one of the first employees to receive the vaccine. Dr. Roberts shares, "Today, I received the first of two doses for my COVID-19 vaccination. I strongly encourage all DOC employees, the people we incarcerate, and the public to also get vaccinated as soon as it is available to them. This virus has wreaked havoc in our communities, and I am sure, like me, many of you are ready to get back to normal life. As the Chief Medical Officer for the Department of Corrections, I've seen first-hand the epidemic in the

prison setting and know we need to fight back with all tools available. Some of the worst outbreaks in Oregon have been in institutional settings and this virus does not stay behind the prison walls, it seeps out into the surrounding community. Vaccinations at DOC begin with individuals who are in close contact with COVID-19-positive individuals and infectious materials. This includes medical providers and nurses, transport employees, security staff working on COVID-19 units and/or performing hospital watches, and a small number of AICs whose work assignments involve cleaning and disinfecting in COVID-19-positive units. "The 13,000 adults in DOC custody miss seeing their friends and family, and vaccines will help us open visiting again. And as essential public safety professionals, DOC employees and their loved ones deserve some peace of mind and protection against the virus. Again, I encourage all Oregonians to get vaccinated and help us turn the tide. Even if you are skeptical, please consider those around you – your elderly parents, your neighbors, your community members who have underlying health conditions. We have all made sacrifices this year, but getting the vaccine is a heroic act and an enormous step toward protecting the lives of all Americans." DOC is collaborating with our local public health officials, coordinating with the Oregon Health Authority (OHA), and following the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommendations to prevent the spread of COVID-19. DOC is following OHA's guidance on long-term care facilities and

law enforcement recommendations. DOC operates 14 prisons across the state and incarcerates approximately 13,000 adults in custody. For information on DOC's COVID-19 efforts, please visit DOC's website at oregon.gov/doc.

Possible Road Rage

The Coos County Major Crime Team and Crash Team were activated Sunday, Dec. 27, following a possible Road Rage incident in North Bend that resulted in the death of a 28-year old male. According to a news release from District Attorney R. Paul Frasier, authorities have turned to the public in an effort to help locate a person of interest in the case, 40-year old Joshua James Thompson, whose last known address was in Coquille. Frasier says the incident began about 11:27 a.m. on the 2700 block of Union Ave. "Officers responded to the scene and found North Bend resident Michael David Moore deceased. He suffered from what appeared to be extensive crush type injuries." Three vehicles were reportedly involved in the Road Rage, a black Ford Ranger pickup and a Chevrolet Tahoe. The third vehicle was described as a Honda Prelude, red in color with a light-colored hood. The suspect reportedly fled the scene in the Prelude. "The investigation suggests that this incident commenced near the Liberty Theater in downtown North Bend. It then proceeded south on Sherman Avenue turning west on either Oregon or Maryland Avenues then turning south on Union Avenue. One of the vehicles, the black Ford Ranger, crashed into a curb and became undrivable. It is believed that Mr. Moore was an occu-

pant of the black Ford Ranger. Mr. Moore exited the vehicle and confronted the driver of the Tahoe. At some point Mr. Moore and the Tahoe moved further south on Union Avenue. The Tahoe struck Mr. Moore, running into the residence at 2719 Union Avenue and causing damage to the residence. The Tahoe then left the scene followed by the red Honda Prelude." The Tahoe was found abandoned on Chester Street. Anyone with information about Thompson's location is asked to contact law enforcement.

North Bend Homicide Investigation

News release from Coos Co. District Attorney R. Paul Frasier. Dec. 29, 2020 – "The investigation into the death of Michael Moore is continuing. As of this moment the person of interest in this case, Joshua Thompson, has not been located by police. The investigators in the case are especially interested in talking with any person who say Mr. Thompson at any time on Sunday, December 27. Anyone with such information or who knows the current location of Mr. Thompson, is encouraged to contact the North Bend Police Dept." Police are still interested in a red Honda Prelude, white or light colored engine hood, that is believed to be involved in this case. "Despite what is being stated on social media, the vehicle is not a Mustang convertible. Anyone who recognizes or has seen this vehicle is asked to contact North Bend Police." A **second news release** from the DA on Dec. 29, stated the red vehicle had been located in a remote rural area of North Coos County on private forest land. The vehicle turned out to be a red Toyota Camry with a sunroof. It has been impounded. Frasier also reports that an autopsy on

Moore showed he died as a result of severe crushing injuries to his chest and abdomen.

CBPD release - On December 8, 2020, at approximately 1205 hours, the Coos Bay Police Department received a 9-1-1 call from a citizen in the parking lot of Banner Bank, downtown Coos Bay. The caller reported a suspicious vehicle, described as a silver or grey newer model Mitsubishi Outlander SUV with either no license plates or a license plate cover, had followed her from North Bend into Coos Bay almost crashing into her multiple times along the way. The caller reported she got out of her vehicle at Banner Bank to use the ATM and noticed the SUV had followed her into the parking lot. While she was at the ATM the driver of the SUV exited his vehicle, approached her vehicle, and proceeded to stab one of her tires multiple times. The driver of the SUV was described as a white male adult, in his thirties, wearing a red AC/DC shirt and a mask that covered his face. The driver then got back into his SUV and fled the scene. The Coos Bay Police Department has reason to believe this subject has been part of several similar incidents, throughout the county, including at-

tempting to pull people over with fake emergency vehicle lights. Be cautious of these attempts. Remember: it is reasonable for a driver being stopped to proceed to the nearest safe place to stop if they believe the location of a traffic stop is unsafe. We suggest turning on your emergency flashers to acknowledge the officer; and drive safe and at the speed limit to a populated or well-lit area to stop. CCSO release - On December 16th, 2020 at approximately 10:17 PM, a traffic stop was initiated by Coos County Deputies on Hwy. 42 near Hyland Rd. A red Hyundai Tiburon with no license plates had been observed by Deputies swerving out of his lane of travel in an area of construction near the junction of Hwy. 42 and Hwy. 101. At the initiation

of the traffic stop the driver, later identified as 32 year old Steven M. White of Coos Bay, accelerated to a speed of approximately 74 miles an hour. Deputies pursued the vehicle as it drove Eastbound on Hwy. 42 toward Coquille. Near the intersection of Hwy. 42 and Green Acres, Mr. White performed a U-turn and drove the vehicle back toward the City of Coos Bay reaching speeds up to 90 miles per hour and driving in the wrong lane of travel. Mr. White ran over placed spike strips at the intersection of Hwy. 101 and Coos Sumner Rd. and then again later in downtown Coos Bay. He ultimately lost both front tires, and had both rear tires deflated, but continued attempting to elude Deputies. Deputies were aided by both the Coos Bay Police Department and the North Bend Police Department as the vehicle drove both in the correct and the oncoming lane of traffic through their cities. Due to the erratic driving pursuing deputies and officers backed into a “slack pursuit” once on Virginia Ave. Mr. White’s vehicle ultimately stopped functioning and caught fire near the intersection of Lakeshore Dr. and Morrison Rd. Mr. White ran on foot from that area and was later apprehended by canine Deputy Odin.

Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies responded to the scene and located Mark Campbell, 66, of Waldport. Campbell was pronounced deceased at the scene from injuries he sustained during the fight. No suspect(s) have been arrested in connection with this incident. The investigation is ongoing. The Sheriff's Office is being assisted by the Oregon State Police Criminal Investigation Unit (CID), Oregon State

Police Forensics, Newport Police, Lincoln City Police and the Lincoln County District Attorney's Office.

Central Coast Homicide Investigation

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office is continuing the homicide investigation that began on the morning of December 6, 2020 involving victim, Mark Campbell. The crime scene has been processed by the Oregon State Police - Crime Scene unit. Evidence collected at the scene has been collected and referred to the Oregon State Police Crime Lab for analysis. No arrests have been made in connection to the homicide at this time. Investigation revealed 52 year old Jack Edward Sigler of Waldport unlawfully entered the residence on multiple occasions and removed valued property without permission. Sigler was found to be in possession of several items stolen from the residence and was taken into custody by Deputy Dalynn Shinholster and lodged at the Lincoln County Jail on December 9, 2020. On December 15, 2020 Sigler was indicted by a Lincoln County Grand Jury on three counts of Burglary in the 1st Degree (164.225) and one count of Theft in the 1st Degree (164.005) related to the incidents.

A North Oregon Coast surfer was bit on the leg by a shark Sunday, Dec. 6. The incident occurred about 3:30 p.m. at Seaside Cove. The male victim received a gash about eight-inches long, but the injury was not life threatening. He was transported to a nearby hospital's trauma unit.

Bad Santa

Just when you think things could not be more different in 2020 with this pandemic comes the tale from the Central Oregon Coast Thursday, Dec. 10. Police dispatch started receiving 9-1-1 calls in the afternoon about a male dressed in a Santa suit walking alongside Hwy. 101 with what looked like a handgun. That got an immediate response by officers who quickly located 25-year old Jeffrey Stamps, decked out in a Santa outfit. A little question & answer back and forth led to a pat down. That's when Santa pulled out the weapon from his waistband and officers responded with a Taser. Just a reminder this is going on alongside Hwy. 101 with vehicles passing by. The Taser apparently didn't have much of an effect through the Santa suit and Stamps took off. He dropped the weapon, turned out to be all-black replica CO2 BB gun. Santa gave up and was lodged in the Lincoln Co. Jail at Newport on charges of Assaulting a Police Officer, Interfering with Police, Menacing, Resisting Arrest and Disor-

derly Conduct. The Santa suit was exchanged for jail overalls.

Life Saving Story

Kudos to two South Coast Law Enforcement Officers who answered the call and risked their own lives to save an elderly couple during a house fire. The event occurred late Nov. 12, 2020, but what took place wasn't widely reported until a month later. From the Oregon State Police, "An amazing lifesaving story. On November 12, 2020 at approximately 11:05 P.M., Deputy Stout from Curry County Sheriff's Office was dispatched to a structure fire in Brookings, Oregon. Deputy Stout and OSP Trooper Erik Holland were first on scene. The house was 2 stories and was fully engulfed in flames. When they arrived on scene, there was no information about occupants inside. The weather was stormy and heavy winds swirled in the canyon. They were unsure where the driveway was located as the house was up a hill. Deputy Stout parked up the hill and Trooper Holland parked down the hill. As Deputy looked up the driveway, he observed an elderly lady scurrying down the driveway with her walker. He then looked for Trooper Holland. He spotted Trooper Holland fireman carrying an elderly man who was disabled. The man appeared out of it as he was unable to walk and did not have proper clothing on. Trooper Holland carried the man approximately 50-75 yards away from the burning house, exploding cars, and exploding cooking grilles. Trooper Holland saw the exploding cars and continued to carry the man down the entire driveway. Trooper Holland's bravery, courage, and self-less act saved a human's life that night. When you ask a Trooper about these types of incidents the answers always come back very similar: All in a day's work and I was so happy that I was in the right place at the right time. A great example of #teamwork by your public safety agencies here in #Oregon."

Van Duzer Corridor Death Update

OSP release - Oregon State Police Detectives are seeking the public's assistance in identifying the remains of an individual discovered in rural Lincoln County. On December 10, 2020, Investigators were summoned to the H.B. Van Duzer Forest State Scenic Corridor for a death investigation. At this location, investigators found the remains of a female child. The Oregon State Medical Examiner's Office estimate the deceased's age to be 6.5 to 10 years old. She is approximately 3'10" to 4'6" tall, and had long hair that is dark brown or black. Her race or ethnic origin has yet to be determined, but DNA analysis is not complete. Due to the condition of the remains she had likely been deceased at least 30 days before she was discovered. If you have any information that might help investigators in identifying this child, please call 800-442-0776 or *OSP (*677). No information regarding the cause or manner of death is available for release at this time.

Multiple Vehicle Crash on Hwy. 101

On December 13, 2020 at approximately 11:41 A.M., a four-vehicle, serious injury collision occurred on US 101 near MP 40. Three vehicles were headed southbound: a silver, 2010, Infinity, G37X, followed by a silver, 2019, GMC, Sierra, followed by a silver, 2009, Nissan Xterra. A tan, Ford motorhome was northbound. Witnesses stated the Infinity had been swerving out of its lane for miles prior to the collision and almost caused other collisions. The Infinity turned left into the northbound lane. The front of the Infinity struck the rock embankment on the shoulder. The motorhome struck the passenger side of the Infinity. The Infinity spun several times and came to an uncontrolled rest in the northbound lane. The motorhome continued forward and struck the GMC. The GMC spun around and came to an uncontrolled rest in the northbound lane. The motorhome continued forward and swerving right to avoid going over a cliff. The motor home then struck the

front of the Nissan. The Nissan spun around and then the motorhome struck the driver side of the Nissan pushing it up against the rock embankment on the northbound shoulder. The Nissan came to an uncontrolled rest. The motorhome came to an uncontrolled rest blocking both lanes. The driver of the Infinity was transported by ground ambulance and then air ambulance to Legacy Emanuel Hospital. The passenger of the Infinity was transported by ground ambulance to Tillamook Hospital. The passenger of the motorhome was transported by ground ambulance to a hospital in Clatsop Co. The motorhome was towed by Burden's towing and all others were towed by South County Towing. The highway was closed for approximately 4.3 hours. OSP was assisted by Tillamook County Sheriff's Office, Manzanita Police Department and Nehalem Bay Fire and Rescue. A Collision reconstructionist was called to the scene. Multiple empty alcohol containers were found in Infinity and the driver of that car admitted to drinking and using cocaine that day. Exigent blood was taken from the driver of the Infinity on scene. The investigation is ongoing.

Pedestrian Hit on Hwy. 101

On Wednesday, November 25, 2020 at about 5:19 PM, Lincoln City Police Officers were dispatched to a pedestrian struck by a vehicle at the intersection of Highway 101 and NW 15th Street in Lincoln City. Lincoln City Police Officers arrived to find a female lying in the roadway near the intersection. An off-duty firefighter rendered aid until medics arrived on scene. The female identified as 40-year-old Shannon Hogan of Lincoln City sustained multiple fractures and internal injuries was transported by ambulance to Legacy Emmanuel Hospital. She is expected to survive her injuries. During the subsequent crash investigation it was learned that the female had been crossing Highway 101 in a marked crosswalk when she was struck by a vehicle traveling south. The impact caused the female to be thrown into northbound traffic and she was struck by an additional vehicle traveling north. The drivers of both of the involved vehi-

cles remained on scene and were cooperative with the investigation. At the time of the crash the road surface was wet and it was dark, but there were functioning street lights in the area. The female was wearing moderately bright clothing at the time she was hit. Due to the nature of this incident, the Lincoln County Major Crash Team was activated and requested to respond and assisted with the investigation. Assistance at the crash scene was provided by members of the crash team from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the Oregon State Police, the Lincoln City Police Department, and the Lincoln County District Attorney's Office. Additional assistance was provided by North Lincoln Fire & Rescue personnel and from the ODOT Incident Response team. The southbound and northbound lanes of Hwy 101 were closed for several hours while the crash was being investigated, with traffic being diverted around the scene on area side streets. There is no indication at this time that speed or alcohol impairment were factors in this incident and no citations were issued. The investigation is open and anyone with information should contact the Lincoln City Police Department at 541-994-3636.

Bags of Chia Seeds Wash Ashore on Central Coast

OPRD release - Oregon Parks and Recreation Department (OPRD) is cleaning up several bags of chia seeds that washed ashore near Florence and Newport this week. Unusual commercial-sized bags of "sludge" were reported just north of Nye Beach the morning of Dec. 22. Later that day, another beachgoer discovered the likely source just north of Florence: a battered chunk of a shipping

container and two bags of seeds nearby. Although the seeds are not toxic, they do expand when they come into contact with water. "The bags were too heavy to move by hand. We had to cut them up to remove them, or use equipment to haul them out," said ranger Jason Hennessey. At least four bags have sprouted ashore so far. OPRD is still tracking down information about the source. People can help the agency by reporting any additional bags — as well as any other beach debris — to beach.debris@oregon.gov. For safety reasons, it's best for individuals to avoid moving debris themselves. This situation is a good reminder to all to pack out your own trash. Some beach access parking lots have cleanup bags, but it's good practice to carry some from home. For information on keeping Oregon's beaches clean, go to solveoregon.org or surfrider.org.

Curry Co. Drowning

The body of a 29-year old California male was recovered near the entrance of the Rogue River at Gold Beach on Saturday, Dec. 26. A citizen reported the body to the Curry Co. Sheriff's Office who responded with two Marine Deputies and a boat. They recovered the body of Hector Camarena, of Redwood City, CA. Deputies recognized him as an individual they had contacted in late November at the Lobster Creek Campground, nine-miles east of Gold Beach. It was reported that Camarena had dove into the river on that date, but was pulled to safety and transported to the hospital. The campground host reported him missing on November 30.

On Tuesday, December 1st, 2020, at approximately 10:00 PM, members of the Douglas Interagency Narcotics Team (DINT) executed a search warrant at a residence in the 100 block of Summerwood Court, Roseburg (Green District). There has been a consistent level of high volume vehicle and foot traffic coming and going from the residence for a long period of time. The activity at the residence has been suspected to be drug related, as well as other types of lower level criminal activity. Residences like

this cause substantial livability problems for the surrounding neighborhood. DINT, as well as the other local law enforcement agencies try to address these issues whenever, and wherever possible. He was charged with Unlawful Possession of Methamphetamine and Unlawful Delivery of Methamphetamine. Both subjects were lodged at the Douglas County

Jail.

Two Hour Pursuit, Douglas Co.

DOUGLAS COUNTY, Ore. - A Portland man is in custody following a two hour slow speed pursuit in a stolen vehicle Thursday afternoon. On Thursday, December 17, 2020, around 12:00 pm, a deputy attempted to conduct a traffic stop on a black 1991 Toyota Celica which was displaying the wrong license plate on Interstate 5 near milepost 88 northbound. The driver, later identified by law enforcement as 47-year-old Jeffrey Jay Fahey of Portland, failed to stop for the deputy which resulted in a vehicle pursuit. ROSEBURG, Ore. - A Myrtle Creek man was recognized by Sheriff Hanlin on Monday for actions he took in earlier this year at the scene of a vehicle crash in a small COVID compliant ceremony. On February 19, 2020, at approximately 7:00 PM, Scott Pettibone was traveling in the 2500 block of Canyonville Riddle Road when he observed the glow of a small fire off the side of the road. As he got closer, he realized the fire was the result of a vehicle which had caught fire after crashing head-on into a tree. Pettibone stopped his vehicle to investigate and observed the shadow of a person inside the crashed car. The driver of the crashed car was trapped in the vehicle and was pounding on the window screaming for help as the cab filled up with smoke. Despite the engine compartment and a portion of the cab being on fire; Pettibone was able to get the driver's side door open, remove the victim and carry him to safety on the other side of the road. Pettibone then returned to the car to check for additional victims before calling 911 at which time the vehicle became fully engulfed in flames. On Monday, December 21, 2020, Sheriff Hanlin presented Pettibone

with the Sheriff's Citizen Medal of Valor for his actions. "Scott Pettibone demonstrated, in great degree, the qualities of selflessness and personal courage on that day," Sheriff Hanlin remarked. "There are no doubts that the victim would have perished in the vehicle fire if it weren't for the decisive actions of Mr. Pettibone". Pettibone, age 49, received a medal and a pin for his actions. The Sheriff's Medal of Valor is the most distinguished award presented to a civilian.

Winterization is an important step, even if you live in a moderate region like the Pacific Northwest. Proper winterization will ensure your safety, prolong the longevity of your vessel, and help safeguard the maritime community and environment around you. The Coast Guard frequently responds to sunken vessels and oil discharges at marinas due to

poor winterization. Below are a few items to get you started but if you don't feel comfortable performing these items by yourself, we encourage you to reach out to your boat dealer or local marina for assistance: Remove excess gear – Removing gear that has accumulated over the boating season will make room for cleaning and any necessary repairs. This should include an inspection of all safety gear and replacing any expired or defective gear, including life jackets, fire extinguishers, first aid kit, etc. Drain the water – Properly dispose of any bilge water and drain any fresh water tanks, fittings and lines. During this time check all boat plugs and seals to ensure they are properly set and ready for winter. This is an important step to prevent water lines and tanks from cracking and preventing internal water damage, including mold. Remove waste and materials – Use environmentally friendly chemicals when cleaning your vessel and remember to properly dispose of any

chemicals, oils, and batteries. If you are not sure of where to dispose of these items, check with your marina or local authorities. Whether you are going to keep your boat in the water for the winter or take it out, we encourage you to disconnect your batteries, shut and lock all doors and windows, and secure all covers. Before departure, double check all moorings and ensure they are securely set. If the boat is taken out of the water, shrink wrapping the vessel is also an option. Sealing the vessel is extremely important in preventing capsizing due to heavy rainfall or icing. Be advised that heat lamps pose a potential fire a danger due to improper size and wiring, poor grounding of extension cords, as well as placing too close to flammable materials. As with all maintenance and repairs, consult your owner's manual for any special recommendations or concerns.

Hiker Rescue Cape Arago

USCG release - CAPE ARAGO, Ore. — The Coast Guard medevaced a hiker near Cape Arago State Park Saturday afternoon after he reportedly fell down a cliff and sustained injuries. Watchstanders at Coast Guard Sector North Bend received an agency assistance request at 10:50 a.m. Local emergency responders had arrived on scene but were unable to safely transport the injured hiker from his remote location. At approximately 11 a.m., an MH-65 Dolphin rescue helicopter crew diverted from a training mission to respond. The aircrew refueled at Sector North Bend before arriving on scene at Cape Arago. The MH-65 aircrew landed on a nearby beach at approximately 11:45 a.m., allowing the rescue swimmer to disembark and assess the situation. At 12:30 p.m., the aircrew hoisted the hiker into the helicopter due to the challenging terrain. The hiker was transported to awaiting emergency medical personnel at Sector North Bend where he was reported to be in stable condition. The Coast Guard urges public, whether on the water or exploring trails on land, to remain aware of your surroundings and respect your limitations. Always have a reliable means of communication to reach emergency responders.

USCG Safety for Commercial Crab Season

USCG release - SEATTLE -- The Coast Guard urges commercial fishermen to ensure vessel safety to prevent maritime emergencies before the opening of the Dungeness crab season scheduled to begin **Dec.16**. Marine Investigators from Marine Safety Unit Portland have responded to over 95 marine casualties involving commercial fishing vessels so far this year. The term "marine casualty"

is often misunderstood by mariners and is essentially any non-standard event that disrupts normal operations; like an emergency, accident, collision or damage involving a vessel that occurs upon the navigable waters of the United States. Certain marine casualties are required to be reported to the Coast Guard and are identified in 46 CFR 4.05 -1. Immediately after addressing the resultant safety concerns, the owner, agent, master, operator, or persons-in-charge of a vessel engaged in commercial service, shall notify the nearest Coast Guard Sector Office whenever a vessel is involved in a marine casualty, involving a loss of life, injuries requiring professional medical treatment (treatment beyond first aid), grounding, bridge collision, loss of main propulsion, reduction in the maneuverability of the vessel, an occurrence causing property damage in excess of \$75,000, or an occurrence involving significant harm to the environment. In addition to the immediate notice requirement, a written report is also required. The owner, agent, master, operator, or person-in-charge, shall, within five days, file a written report on Form CG-2692 (Report of Marine Accident Injury, or Death). Failure to make an immediate notification or subsequently file the written report within five days could result in imposed fines not to exceed \$40,640. The Coast Guard reminds all commercial fishermen that prior to crossing a restricted bar between sunset and sunrise, they must notify the Coast Guard on VHF-FM channel 16 or 22A to provide their vessel name, position, number of people aboard, destination and any vessel limitations. After crossing, they are required to report back a safe transit or otherwise. Life jackets or immersion suits must be worn by all persons on deck, or located in any open areas of the vessel while crossing a restricted bar. Life jackets or immersion suits are required to be readily accessible for all persons located in any enclosed spaces of vessels when crossing a bar with restrictions in place. Life jackets are also required whenever a vessel is under tow or while being escorted across the bar by the Coast

Guard. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in a maximum civil penalty of \$25,000. "Without a doubt, Dungeness crab fishermen are anxious to start the 2020-21 commercial crab fishing season," said Lt. Carl Eschler, the assistant chief of the investigations division at Coast Guard Marine Safety Unit Portland. "Be it their first time or 101st time navigating over a bar, fishermen are encouraged to contact their local Coast Guard station to familiarize themselves with bar conditions and reporting methods. Contacting the Coast Guard prior to crossing a restricted bar between sunset and sunrise is more than just a good idea for commercial fishermen, it is a requirement." Lil Tough Guy Nets \$159 Million in Cocaine

USCG release - PORT ANGELES, Wash. – The Coast Guard Cutter Active returned to its homeport of Port Angeles Friday following a 46-day deployment to the Eastern Pacific Ocean, Dec. 18. Nicknamed “Lil Tough Guy,” the Active's crew patrolled 10,056 total nautical miles off the coast of Central America, deployed with an armed Coast Guard MH-65 Dolphin helicopter crew from the Helicopter Interdiction Tactical Squadron (HITRON) in Jacksonville, Florida, which specializes in Airborne Use of Force (AUF) and drug-interdiction missions. HITRON helped Active search for, detect and stop, drug smuggling vessels. Pacific Area Tacti-

cal Law Enforcement Team (TACLET) personnel sailed with the Active and augmented the unit's law enforcement capabilities, proving critical during interdictions. TACLET are Coast Guard members that specialize in counter-narcotics tactics and procedures and deploy aboard U.S. and allied navy ships that transit drug trafficking areas. In just 72 hours, the Active crew interdicted two vessels suspected of drug smuggling and seized approximately 4,200 kg of cocaine worth \$159 million. These efforts resulted in the detainment of 13 suspected narcotics traffickers. The U.S. Coast Guard narcotics interdiction efforts aim to thwart transnational criminal organizations, which are fueled by drug trafficking money. Deployments like the one Active completed attack supply networks in Central and South America. Active's success highlights the impact that a single Coast Guard unit can have when working with interagency and foreign partners. “The Active crew gave everything to this deployment. We proved our readiness by adapting to an unscheduled embarkation of a HITRON helo and seamlessly integrated that crew,” said Cmdr. James O'Mara, Active's commanding officer. “We can-

celled port calls, extended patrol legs, stretched our fuel state and food stores to the limit, all in support of this mission. The crew answered the call, and they executed with distinction. Our success traces back to the support from our families – and these results serve as a capstone for an entire year of operational results, which have confirmed, for me, that no crew compares to Active. Period.” On April 1, U.S. Southern Command began enhanced counter-narcotics operations in the Western Hemisphere to disrupt the flow of drugs in support of Presidential National Security Objectives. Numerous U.S. agencies from the Departments of Defense, Justice, and Homeland Security cooperated to combat transnational organized crime. The Coast Guard, Navy, Customs and Border Protection, FBI, Drug Enforcement Administration, and Immigration and Customs Enforcement, along with allied and international partner agencies, play a role in counter-drug operations. The fight against drug cartels in the Eastern Pacific Ocean and the Caribbean Sea requires unity of effort in all phases from detection, monitoring, and interdictions, to criminal prosecutions for these three interdictions by United States Attorney's

Offices from the Middle District of Florida and the Southern District of California. The law enforcement phase of counter-smuggling operations in the Eastern Pacific Ocean is conducted under the 11th Coast Guard District's authority, headquartered in Alameda. The interdictions, including the actual boardings, are led and conducted by the U.S. Coast Guard members. The Active is a 210-foot medium endurance cutter homeported in Port Angeles and routinely deploys in support of counter-drug, migrant interdiction, fisheries, and search and rescue and homeland security missions.

SAR Finds Overdue Christmas Tree Hunters

Lane Co. Sheriff's release - Missing four year old Zelda and her grandparents Sharon and Gregory were located today after getting their vehicle stuck in the Quartz Creek area of the Willamette National Forest on Monday while they were out looking for a Christmas tree. They were reported missing on Tuesday, December 22, 2020 when Zelda's mom went to pick Zelda up at Sharon and Gregory's house and there was no indication they had returned from the Willamette National Forest. Lane County Search and Rescue teams along with deputies searched the area into the evening and throughout the morning. Shortly before noon today the family's vehicle was spotted by a U.S. Coast Guard helicopter team assisting with the search. They were able to direct ground teams to the vehicle and found Zelda, Sharon, and Gregory safe and unharmed. After getting the family into a warm place with some food and water, we learned that their car got stuck in an area with downed trees and snow. Thankfully they had a blanket, some water, a tarp, and snacks in the car, and were all wearing warm clothing. A huge thank you to all of the Search and Rescue volunteers who assisted with the search, to the U.S. Coast Guard for their assistance, and to the community who kept their eyes out for the family and called in tips!
